As the season ends, I want to personally thank you all for your support. I am so proud of the diversity of opportunities we can provide for our (ski) community; a community that we helped to create and a community that keeps morphing alongside us. You all play such an important part in its development. The sheer amount of people from all backgrounds that found an identity through PVNT and revolve around it in so many ways is probably the most amazing feature of the team over the last eight years.

Plain Valley Nordic Team and Trails became an intricate web of support that is focused on a central idea: Be competitive/Be relevant in a specific environment, challenge that environment, adapt and be relevant once more, stay competitive. That is our core as an education program. Challenge, learn, repeat.

It is also true at an organizational level. Traveling back from the Nationals, I had a lot of time to think. The tone we initially set and the culture we developed really resonated with a growing team. It is easier to be inclusive and supportive

previously understand the level of our skiers, although we have four that are probably in that ballpark. I want to make sure that we keep communicating appropriately. There were a lot of kids overcoming challenges this winter. These challenges are all valid and we empower all of them. That is what creates adherence to the sport (our vessel for education). challenges we can provide, the more kids we can keep involved, not just in sheer numbers but mostly over time. That is what will make us relevant and keep us relevant. The usual word is pipeline, but pipeline gives that idea of a unidimensional funnel towards a singular goal. I do not think it is appropriate for us. I think we are a trail system of challenges/opportunities, with a lot of possibilities. PVNT skiers all start at the base area and funnel around a similar valley, yet there are a lot of different ways to navigate around it and we do not all need to reach the same destination. Hopefully, you get the metaphor.

We all created something so special, it is fragile, growing yet powerful. So, let's keep inviting challenges, and learn from them. It will define a large part of our lives. *#*

#### HOW IT ALL STARTED



Plain Valley Ski Trails was founded by Rob Whitten, owner of Plain Hardware, in 2011, in collaboration with the landowners of Plain Valley, to create a trail network with the intent of supporting its youth. This vision would not be possible without the incredible support of this community!



The Advanced Devo Team (ADT) had an amazing and truly memorable winter season—from skiing our local ski trails to traveling as far as Park City, Utah, for the U14 Championships! As the ADT coach, I try to push all of my skiers to have fun and challenge themselves in different environments. The main environment we use is ski racing, though that is far from the only one.

I had one skier this winter who didn't really want to try racing because he had never done it before. After talking to him and encouraging him to step out of his comfort zone, he decided to try a couple of races. His last race of the season was a classic mass start and he was super nervous about it. I told him to focus on the things he could control like his warm up and the food he ate before the race, to push as hard as he could, and not worry about anyone else.

After his race, he came up to me and said that it was the best race of the season and he was so happy that he competed. After the Devo winter season concluded, kids were given the opportunity to enroll in "bonus practices" to stretch their skills. One of the big challenges offered to the advanced skiers was an opportunity to climb Grizzly Peak.

Skiing "Griz" is no joke, even for experienced adults. The trail has a ridiculous ascent that requires a slow herringbone climb, followed by a stomach-in-your-throat plunge where you have no choice but to point your skis downhill and send it. But the reward at the summit is a view into Glacier Peak Wilderness. For the 20 Devos who made the climb, it was a highlight at the end of a stellar season.

Exhausted and bursting with pride is how you would describe them at the finish. A few of the kids stood out that day—not because they skied flawlessly, but because it was an obvious challenge for them. Grizzly was on the outer edge of their skill set, but missing out on the challenge

didn't sit well with them. By the time the larger group began to climb, several kids had chased down the faster group and demanded the chance. They simply didn't want to miss out and wanted to summit even if it took all night. Their perseverance was rewarded with making it to the top.

Did they struggle? Of course. But everyone succeeded. Exhausted and bursting with pride is how you would describe them at the finish.  $\cancel{m}$
